Scotch Plains-Fanwood High School is a four-year comprehensive high school with an enrollment of 1542 students (2012-2013) reflecting the diversity of the nation at large. In order to qualify for graduation, students must complete one hundred and twenty (120) credits of course work. Our DECA (Distributive Education Club of America) students continue to excel in both the state and national competitions. The high school newspaper, the Fanscotian, and our yearbook, the Culmen, have both been recognized at the state and national levels for their quality publications, and our literary magazine, the MUSE, has also been ranked as one of the best in the state. This past year, the Fanscotian won the award for Best in Overall Excellence from the NJ Garden State Scholastic Press Association. Many of the co-curricular clubs are dedicated to service based initiatives within the SPF community, state, nation, and throughout the world. Each year our Student Movement Against Cancer (SMAC) raises over \$100,000 for the American Cancer Society in an effort to find a cure for this terrible disease. The Interact Club raised money for young women in Uganda and the Students Concerned for the Needy continues to stock the shelves of many local food pantries. Our Model UN continues to be recognized as one of the top delegations at the annual competition. These are just a few of the thriving student organizations that we offer at SPFHS.

While we clearly understand our strengths are supported by an outstanding staff, involved community, and superior academic and co-curricular programs, we also recognize the need to

continually improve. We are committed to meeting the needs of all students. We are constantly examining the current research on teaching and learning and applying it to our needs.
